How Should Your Risk Tolerance Influence Investment Decision?

As an investor, how much risk can you tolerate? It's an important question — because the answer can help you make the right investment choices.

Before you know your risk tolerance, you'll want to make sure you first understand the nature of investment risk — the risk of losing principal. This risk is especially prevalent when you invest in stocks, because stock prices will always fluctuate — and there are never any guarantees about performance. Of course, a decline in value does not mean you need to sell; you can always hold on to the stock with the hope that its value will bounce back. And this can certainly happen, but again — no guarantees.

How you respond to this type of investment risk will tell you a great deal about your own risk tolerance. Of course, no one, whether he or she has a high tolerance for risk or a low one, particularly likes to see declines. But people do react differently. If you're the sort of person who can retain your confidence in your investment mix and can focus on the long term and the potential for a recovery, you may well have a higher tolerance for risk. But if you find yourself los-

ing sleep over your losses (even if, at this point, they're just "paper" losses), becoming despondent about reaching your goals, and questioning whether you should be investing at all, then you may have a low tolerance for risk.

This self-knowledge of your own risk tolerance should help inform your investment decisions — to a point.

Even if you determine you have a high tolerance for risk, you almost certainly should not load up your portfolio exclusively with stocks. If the stock market enters a prolonged slump, you could face heavy losses that may take many years to overcome, causing you to lose significant ground in the pursuit of your financial goals. Conversely, even if you discover you don't have much tolerance for risk, you won't want to invest only in supposedly "safe" vehicles, such as certificates of deposit (CDs). During those periods when rates on CDs and similar instruments are low, as has been the case in recent years, your interest payments from these investments may not even keep up with inflation — meaning that, over time, you could end up losing purchasing power, which, over the long term, can be

just as big a risk as market declines.

Ultimately, then, you'll probably want to let your risk tolerance guide your investment choices — but not dictate them with an "iron hand." So, if you believe you are highly tolerant of risk, you might have a somewhat higher percentage of stocks in your portfolio than if you felt yourself to be highly risk-averse — but in any case, you'll likely benefit from building a diversified portfolio containing stocks, bonds, government securities, CDs and other investments. While this type of diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against loss, it can help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio.

By knowing your own risk tolerance, and the role it can play in your choices, you can help yourself create an effective, suitable investment strategy — one that you can live with for a long time and that can help you avoid the biggest risk of all: not reaching your long-term goals.

Seats Available

There are four 3-year seats on the 2013 Princeton Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors (PACC). All nominees, i.e. candidates must be a member or employee of a member of the PACC. The PACC Board of Directors is composed of twelve (12) members

To any/all interested persons

Please read the following information carefully. If interested in a position, please submit to the PACC Office, a short "bio" about yourself or your nominee stating background, work and connection to Princeton, along with any pertinent comments you'd like to add. Please turn this in by Wednesday, October 23 by 4:00pm.

Requirements for Board Seat

A board candidate must be a current member or member affiliate in good standing with the PACC. He/She may be a business owner/operator, employee of same, or a PACC member through a civic group or organization.

Chamber Board of Directors' meetings are held monthly, on the first and third Wednesdays, at 4:00 p.m. at city offices. These are normally 1 to 1-1/2 hour sessions and members are required to attend as many meetings as possible throughout the year. To miss three consecutive meetings without acceptable excuse, will result in removal from the board.

Quarterly attendance is also required at The PACC monthly General Membership meeting open to all members. Board Directors are expected to attend at least one general meeting and ribbon cutting a quarter. These are scheduled during Noon to 1:00 p.m. time slots with brief ribbon cuttings directly following, with location rotating between various member conference and restaurant facilities.

The PACC annual meeting is held during the fourth quarter of each year. In 2013 this meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 12. Current members of the board are required to attend.

Course of Action

Princeton Area Chamber of Commerce is in the midst of strategic planning to create a long-term plan to support and uplift our business community and create laser focus to best utilize resources. This is done through various business initiatives, partnerships with other organizations (including governmental bodies), and tapping into the talents and resources of our members to help support and encourage each other in business.

In addition, PACC is actively involved in producing, sponsoring and co-sponsoring many events within and for the community. PACC consists of various "project committees" responsible for structure and presentation of each event. Basically each committee consists of:

1. A Project Leader (seasoned board member);
2. A 2nd in Command;
3. A "Rookie" Board Member;
4. The PACC Executive Director.

This initial group recruits helper members, and meets regularly within an appropriate time frame, to plan and produce each event.

New members normally begin at a "learning level" and then by final year of their terms, are able to take the lead responsibility on projects.

Requests for downtown improvements within downtown corridor from Downtown Committee of the Chamber

- Striping both public parking lots on Rum River Drive (South and North Malls). Establish clear handicap and long term (Daily) parking spaces along fencing from regular shopping parking close to building, adding to the aesthetic and "welcomeness" and organization of these public spaces downtown.

- Re-landscape green spaces below black wrought-iron fencing along Rum River Dr- (Both Malls, at 2nd street south and near Family Pathways and any in-between) –

- Remove every-other over grown plant/grasses

- Replace with new flowering bush/Reed grasses (cattails)

- Replace garden fabric (weed blocker) and Mulch over top.

- ~Working with Prairie Restoration to design / plan which plants best to use.

- Preventative Weed spray all sidewalks along downtown corridor in early Spring (both sides of street) and alleyways. Have Bob Goodell spray while watering city flower pot. Secondly, after spraying issue a notice to building/business owners of their responsibility to then maintain weed control thereafter when/if weeds grow after the preventative spray.

- Snow removal at all crosswalks corners and removal of snow mounds from handicap-spaces enabling access to sidewalks from parking spaces (-Snow mounds that build up where street and sidewalks meet inhibit individuals from using ramps/wheelchairs and are unsafe non-flat walking areas.)

- Re-paint (epoxy paint) crosswalks on all streets within downtown. (see photos) including those that run parallel with Rum River Drive and 1st Street *Working with County to coordinate project saving time and money using same contractor.

- *County has received the request to repaint crosswalks that crossover Rum River Drive and 1st Street North.

- Re-paint (using acrylic paint = City sprayer) all parking spaces and handicap curbing within the downtown area. (Including those that are on Rum River Drive and 1st Street per the 2007 County policy/ordinance that require Cities to maintain parking place painting maintenance on County roads within city limits)

- Place more garbage cans along West side of Rum River Drive and 1st street. And additional cans during festival and community events.

- Establish a yearly notice to all building and business owners of their responsibilities related to the upkeep and maintenance of sidewalks in front of their buildings- snow removal/sweeping/garbage/weeds etc.

- Establish a schedule to sweep downtown streets and notify building owners/ businesses of schedule of when best to sweep sidewalks prior to maximize dirt/dust pick up when city sweeper is scheduled.

Sherburne Refuge Classroom Building Project Underway

Excitement was in the air early in August as a team of U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service professionals began groundwork for a long-awaited education building. An entrance/exit road was created, driveway and parking areas carved out, and a large gravel pad constructed, which will be the base for the refuge's new facility. The building will be constructed off Sherburne County Road 9, south of the Old School House site. Plans are to send the building project out for bids in October, with hopes that construction could begin in the spring.

With the popularity of Sherburne's education programs, tours, and other outreach events, this new building is something refuge staff and Friends have been working toward for many years. The classroom is one part of a larger design that includes a visitor center and headquarters complex, which can be added on at a future date, when funds are available.

But as we look to the future, we also must look to the past. For more than 30 years, the Old School House served as the hub for refuge events, meetings, and other public gatherings. Over time, the building developed significant health and safety issues with a sagging roof, mold, and a host of other problems, causing it to be closed in November, 2010. This summer the Friends of Sherburne paid for a National Register Evaluation of the building, and the Old School House did not meet the criteria for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. Consequently, the building will be given a respectful send-off later this fall when local firefighters will use it in an educational training exercise that will help to increase their skills, thereby benefitting the community. A historical marker will be placed at the schoolhouse site to honor the memory of this local landmark.
